For generations. That's how long Nicklaus Children's has served the South Florida community and beyond. Since our founding in 1950 and through the decades to follow, enduringly, we have been the place where children matter most: the region's only freestanding children's hospital.

Even as we provide care for half a million children annually – offering nearly every pediatric specialty and the latest innovative therapies – we continuously reach forward to ensure that we are ready to serve generations to come.

Our 2023 momentum included many new initiatives. A Nicklaus Children's pilot study to assess the impact of rapid whole genome sequencing for critically ill children led to Florida Medicaid funding this innovative testing for undiagnosed children. This is supporting faster diagnoses and more targeted care for children right now, across South Florida.

We opened an Undiagnosed Disease Clinic to help provide answers for families on a diagnostic odyssey and we were the first in Florida to offer new treatments for Duchenne muscular dystrophy and anterior cruciate ligament tears as part of our commitment to bringing leading-edge care to the children we serve.

In our role as the South Florida affiliate of Project ADAM, we trained hundreds of area schools in how to respond to sudden cardiac arrest events. This positioned us to complete training for 100 percent of eligible schools in Miami-Dade County Public Schools in the first half of 2024. As a result of this initiative, three South Florida lives were saved in 2023 by Project Adam-trained school staff, including two teens and an adult.

I hope you will take a moment to review our many 2023 initiatives, as well as patient stories that illustrate the lifesaving and life-enhancing ways we support the children of South Florida and beyond. Our achievements would not have been possible without the commitment and leadership of our Nicklaus Children's family – physicians, clinical and support teams, donors, board members, and the patients and families who look to us for care and support.

Many exciting developments are underway in 2024 that will move Nicklaus Children's *Forward For Generations*! We look forward to sharing more information soon, and collaborating to support healthy tomorrows for the children of our region and beyond.



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EXPANDING A HEART-SAVING MISSION – AND SAVING LIVES!

Nicklaus Children's Heart Institute is leading our community forward in preventing sudden cardiac death, a common cause of death among adults and children nationwide. By the end of 2023, institute team members had provided training to address sudden cardiac arrest events for staff at 291 schools, including many within the Miami-Dade County Public Schools system, as well as private and charter schools in Miami-Dade and Broward counties. By the first half of 2024, all eligible Miami-Dade public schools had received the training.

The effort is paying off and saving lives. In 2023, two students and an adult were resuscitated by school staff trained by the Heart Institute's Project ADAM team members.

Nicklaus Children's Heart Institute, a regional leader in the care of children with congenital heart defects, is proud to be the local affiliate of Project ADAM, an organization dedicated to offering life-saving training to counter sudden cardiac arrest.

Staff at participating schools learn how to perform CPR, use automated external defibrillators and develop a site-specific response plan. Upon completion, participating schools receive a two-year Project ADAM certification and commit to performing monthly drills

Project ADAM at Nicklaus Children's receives support from the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation and the Coral Gables Community Foundation.


NEW CLINIC OFFERS HOPE FOR FAMILIES ON A 'DIAGNOSTIC ODYSSEY'

For some families of children with rare diseases, the search for a diagnosis can be a prolonged and frustrating experience. Many have found themselves on a "diagnostic odyssey," visiting multiple specialists in search of answers.

In 2023, Nicklaus Children's opened its Undiagnosed Disease Clinic in the Precision Medicine Center, offering new hope to families in search of answers. The clinical team has access to the latest genetic testing options, including many that are not commonly available, such as rapid whole genome sequencing (rWGS). The Undiagnosed Disease Clinic helped 237 children in 2023.

Also in 2023, thanks in large part to research conducted by Nicklaus Children's in collaboration with the Sanford Children's Genomic Medicine Consortium, Florida Medicaid began funding rWGS for critically ill children with unknown diagnoses who are receiving care in intensive care units. This means more families now have access to this vital tool, which can identify diagnoses and potential treatments.

Reduction in perception of pain associated with use of Smileyscope

MAKING NEEDLE STICKS MORE KID FRIENDLY

For patients in Nicklaus Children's Emergency Department, blood draws and injections are now mostly stress free. How? In 2023 the hospital introduced Smileyscope, a virtual reality therapeutic device to soothe kids during such procedures.

"Needle procedures can be very stressful for children of all ages," said Dr. Vincenzo Maniaci, Medical Director of the Nicklaus Children's Emergency Department. "The Smileyscope virtual reality (VR) tool supports our emergency clinicians in providing the artful distraction that is so beneficial to children during such procedures. Families can request VR support to reduce their child's discomfort and anxiety."

One of the most requested VR experiences sought by children is Smileyscope's underwater adventure, featuring images of waves washing over the injection site and a fish nibbling on the child's arm during the injection. Clinical trials have shown this VR program can safely and effectively reduce pediatric needle pain by up to 60 percent and anxiety by 40 percent, allowing for a more comfortable and positive patient experience. The use of Smileyscope is supported in part by the Hecktman Family Foundation.

HELPING TEENS ON THE SPECTRUM MOVE FORWARD BEHIND THE WHEEL

Securing a driver's license – a rite of passage for many teens and young adults – can seem out of reach for many on the autism spectrum. Anxiety associated with taking the driver's test can pose a barrier for neurodivergent youth.


As part of its commitment to supporting neurodiverse children and teens on their life journey, Nicklaus Children's Hospital launched a virtual reality program aimed at helping prepare eligible students to take their driving exams.

"The DRIVE Program uses fully immersive virtual reality technology to provide students with an experience that simulates a driving exam," said Dr. David Seo, Senior Vice President and Chief Information and Digital Officer for Nicklaus Children's Health System. "Students receive immediate feedback related to various driving scenarios in which they participate through a computer-simulated instructor."

In addition, a trained behavioral analyst helps guide students through each scenario while monitoring student stress and anxiety levels. Students work with the behavioral analyst to learn the rules of the road through a tailored course curriculum. The program was launched with support from The Taft Foundation.

BREAKTHROUGH TREATMENT FOR DUCHENNE MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY

Nicklaus Children's Hospital became one of the first in the nation and only the second hospital in Florida to offer a newly approved gene therapy for Duchenne muscular dystrophy (DMD). Nicklaus Children's Brain Institute offers Sarepta Therapeutics ELEVIDYS, which is approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for treatment of DMD in ambulatory pediatric patients ages 4 to 5. Two patients received the treatment in 2023.

"At Nicklaus Children's we always seek the latest, emerging treatments to support children with complex disorders," said Dr. Migvis Monduy, Medical Director of the Neuromuscular and Movement Disorders Program. "It is our hope this treatment will delay or halt the progression of DMD for eligible children, offering them brighter tomorrows. Our use of emerging treatments is one more reason why Nicklaus Children's is the hospital where children matter mostTM."

AMONG FIRST IN NORTH AMERICA TO STUDY NEW INVESTIGATIONAL TREATMENT

In 2023, Nicklaus Children's became one of three sites in North America taking part in a Phase I clinical trial studying the role of a new technology called low-frequency focused ultrasound in the care of children with a lethal type of brain tumor that forms in the brainstem. Physician scientists at Nicklaus Children's are hopeful that the addition of the focused ultrasound will help chemotherapy agents to better reach diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma (DIPG) tumors by disrupting the blood-brain barrier that typically protects the brain from some agents in the bloodstream.

Nicklaus Children's is proud to be one of the largest providers of pediatric research in Florida, managing studies that bring potentially breakthrough treatments to children and families seeking new hope as they battle critical illness.

NEW SURGICAL METHOD KEEPS KIDS MOVING FORWARD

Nicklaus Children's Orthopedic, Sports Medicine and Spine Institute became the first in South Florida to offer a breakthrough treatment for anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) tears in 2023. The BEAR® Implant is a medical advancement to enable the body to heal its own torn ACL, offering an alternative to the current standard of care – reconstruction that replaces the ACL with a graft – and appears to promote faster recovery. Since March 2023, the hospital has performed five BEAR implant procedures on patients ranging in age from 14 to 17.

Every year, approximately 400,000 ACL injuries occur in the U.S. The population group most affected by these injuries is adolescent females ages 15 to 20, followed by males of the same age. A torn ACL does not heal without treatment, resulting in ACL reconstruction being one of the most common orthopedic procedures in the U.S. "For eligible patients, there are a number of advantages to restoring a ligament instead of replacing it," said Dr. Craig Spurdle, Medical Director of the Orthopedic, Sports Medicine and Spine Institute.

ADAPTIVE CARE: FORWARD FOR CHILDREN WITH NEURODEVELOPMENTAL DELAYS

For children with neurodevelopmental delays and their families, a hospital stay can be challenging. Hospitalization separates neurodivergent children from the routines and predictability they typically find soothing. Unfamiliar people, places and equipment add to the discomfort.

To help create a better hospital experience for this patient population, Nicklaus Children's in 2023 founded its Adaptive Care Program. The care team works with the child and family to understand patient preferences, modify the environment when indicated, and plan response strategies for challenging behaviors. The program was made possible with generous support from The Frederick A. DeLuca Foundation.

"The Adaptive Care Program is truly transforming the inpatient care experience for our patients who have communication and behavioral vulnerabilities, such as our neurodivergent children," said Jessica Thomas, Executive Director of Inpatient/
Outpatient Rehabilitation Services. "It has been an honor to work alongside families and the many professionals who have helped develop this important program. As a result, our neurodivergent patients receive individualized care plans that create a hospital experience that is less stressful, not only for the child but for the entire family."

TWO DECADES OF ACCREDITATION LEADERSHIP

Nicklaus Children's Helen & Jacob Shaham Cancer & Blood Disorders Institute renewed its accreditation from the Foundation for the Accreditation of Cellular Therapy (FACT) in 2023, marking the 20th year that the hospital has been recognized by the nonprofit organization.

FACT is dedicated to optimizing healthcare cellular therapy practice through rigorous and comprehensive inspections of participating organizations.

"Nicklaus Children's Shaham Cancer & Blood Disorders Institute is committed to offering the highest level of care. Our voluntary participation with FACT and our longstanding accreditation ensures patients and families of our commitment to offering children the best possible, safest care," said Dr. Jorge Galvez Silva, Medical Director, Blood and Marrow Transplant Program.

Blood and marrow transplants are used in the treatment of a wide range of disorders in children, including malignant leukemias, lymphomas and neuroblastomas. The approach is also used in the treatment of non-malignant conditions, including sickle cell disease, metabolic storage disorders and more.





NEW HOPE FOR JACOB

Hope was in short supply for Jacob and his family after he was diagnosed with Duchenne muscular dystrophy. Duchenne is a rare, genetic disease characterized by progressive muscle damage and weakness that occurs in approximately one in every 3,500 newborn males worldwide. Those affected typically succumb to the disease in their 20s or 30s.

Thanks to a new treatment offered at only a few hospitals nationwide, Jacob, now age 6, was able to receive the first FDA-approved gene therapy for DMD at Nicklaus Children's in 2023.

Jacob's mother Erika said, "Being the first patient in South Florida to receive this treatment, and for everything to be a success has given me hope for his future."

LIFE-SAVING CARE FOR NICOLE

"My brain hurts, mommy." Tamara remembers vividly when her daughter, Nicole, now 11, began complaining of head pain. When the pain persisted, the family was referred to Nicklaus Children's for evaluation.

The clinical team at Nicklaus Children's quickly noted the child's eyes were swelling and ordered more testing, which revealed a malignant brain tumor requiring immediate neurosurgery. The family benefited from the collaborative care of the Nicklaus Children's Helen & Jacob Shaham Cancer & Blood Disorders Institute and the Nicklaus Children's Brain Institute, which together oversee the hospital's Neuro-Oncology Program.

Today, Nicole is thriving. "We are so very fortunate that we received the best cancer care imaginable for Nicole right here in our home community," said her mother, Tamara.





HELP FOR KAI, A NEXT-GENERATION HEART PATIENT

When Jackie and Rob received the news that their baby-to-be would be born with congenital heart defects, they knew exactly where to seek care. Having been diagnosed with a heart defect herself as a teenager, Jackie had undergone heart surgery years before at what was then known as Miami Children's Hospital.

Once Kai arrived, he was immediately transferred to the Nicklaus Children's Heart Institute, where he eventually underwent a successful open-heart surgery to correct his anomaly. Kai is thriving and continues to be monitored by the Heart Institute team.

"It's never easy to hand your baby over for care. In my case, it was made easier, knowing it was the same surgeon who had cared for me," said Jackie.

INNOVATIVE TREATMENT HAS CANDIDO RACING FORWARD AGAIN

Candido, age 3, is a little body in fast motion once again, thanks to a complex state-of-the-art treatment for a rare bone defect called congenital pseudoarthrosis of the tibia (CPT). Candido's condition only came to light after the active preschooler took a tumble that landed him in the emergency room, where an X-ray revealed the rare condition that affects one in 250,000.

The family was referred to the Orthopedic, Sports Medicine and Spine Institute at Nicklaus Children's where Dr. Daniel Ruggles offers special expertise in treating children with limb deformities. Candido underwent surgery to remove abnormal fibrous tissue, stabilize the bone and create an environment to promote growth of a straight and strong tibia, through use of internal and external fixators.

"Our ultimate goal in CPT is to restore a child to normal function.

To run, play, and function normally requires restoring the leg bone's strength and ability to grow and heal," said Dr. Ruggles.

Candido is well on his way.





2023 BRINGS EXPANDED HAGERTY FAMILY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH UNIT AND PLANNING FOR NEW OUTPATIENT BEHAVIORAL HEALTH OFFICE

2023 saw the opening of 20 new beds within the hospital's Psychiatry Unit, doubling the number available to support inpatient psychiatry care, a huge need within the community and beyond.

The expansion was made possible through the generosity of philanthropists Michelle and Michael Hagerty, who contributed \$5 million to establish what is now the Hagerty Family Behavioral Health Unit.

In addition, the hospital received \$1 million in 2023 federal funding to establish a Nicklaus Children's behavioral health outpatient office in South Miami. The new facility will offer expanded consultative space to enable the program to serve more children. The associated funds were made possible thanks to the work of Congresswoman Maria Elvira Salazar.

"The last few years have shone a light on the importance of supporting the mental health needs of children," said

Dr. Marcos Mestre, Vice President and Chief Medical Officer, Nicklaus Children's Hospital. "We are so grateful to the

Hagertys and Congresswoman Salazar for understanding the vital need to provide children with mental health support," he said.

The Nicklaus Children's inpatient unit is one of the state's largest mental health units dedicated especially to the care of children and teens.

TOPPING OUT PUTS GRIFFIN SURGICAL TOWER ON TRACK FOR 2024 OPENING

Nicklaus Children's leaders and construction crew members celebrated the "topping out" of Nicklaus Children's Kenneth C. Griffin Surgical Tower in 2023, placing the final structural beam atop the 131,000-square-foot construction site.

As part of the celebration, employees, donors and patient families signed a construction beam displayed in the lobby. Hospital namesakes, Jack and Barbara Nicklaus, and donor Ken Griffin were among the hundreds who added their signatures to the beam. The completion of the construction milestone ensures the project is on track for the planned 2024 opening, when the tower will offer a state-of-the-art setting for the 16,000-plus pediatric surgeries performed annually at the hospital.

The Kenneth C. Griffin Surgical Tower is named for philanthropist Ken Griffin, Founder and CEO of Citadel and Founder of Griffin Catalyst, who made a transformational \$25 million gift to support the tower and the future of pediatric surgical care.





FOUNDATION CELEBRATES REMARKABLE FUNDRAISING YEAR

In 2023, Nicklaus Children's Hospital Foundation raised nearly \$24.5 million to benefit the patients and families of Nicklaus Children's Hospital. Generous donations included:

- A \$1 million donation from the Saka family to support various programs including the Adaptive Care Program, music therapy, palliative care, children's experiences, and the Cardiac Intensive Care Unit (CICU).
- The Batchelor Foundation issued a \$250,000 grant to benefit the Mobile Dental Unit. Other grantors include Delta Dental, Florida Blue Foundation and the Kirk Foundation, with new 2023 support for the Mobile Dental Unit totaling \$357,000.
- Hyundai Hope on Wheels, STOP Children's Cancer of Palm Beach County and Ayúdame a Vivir Foundation issued grants totaling \$192,000 overall for cancer research.





FOUNDATION LAUNCHES DONOR ADVISED FUND

Nicklaus Children's is among the first health systems in the state to offer its own donor advised fund, following Nicklaus Children's Hospital Foundation's 2023 launch of the fund in collaboration with BNY Mellon. In 2023, Nicklaus Children's raised more than \$4.3 million through CMN to benefit patients and families. 

MOVING THE NEXT GENERATION OF CLINICIANS FORWARD

FUNDING THE FUTURE OF NURSING

Nicklaus Children's advanced its commitment to supporting the nurses of tomorrow in 2023.

In the fall of 2023, the hospital launched a scholarship program in collaboration with Florida International University (FIU) to fund up to 10 scholarships for students accepted to FIU's bachelor's program in nursing. The first contingent begins their studies in spring 2024 and receive up to \$20,000 each toward their educational expenses.

This builds on a similar program launched in 2022 and ongoing with Miami-Dade College, which provides \$10,000 awards to up to 10 students accepted to the associate of science in nursing program.

"Nursing is an amazing career. We are excited to help these future nurses to pursue their goals and make dreams come true," said Shannon Odell, Vice President and Chief Nursing Officer.












LEAPING FORWARD WITH QUALITY AND SAFETY RECOGNITION



Nicklaus Children's was one of only eight children's hospitals nationwide to be named a Top Children's Hospital by the Leapfrog Group. This national watchdog organization is a recognized standard-setter for healthcare safety and quality.

The quality of patient care across many areas of hospital performance is considered in establishing the qualifications for the award, including infection rates, practices for safer surgery, and the hospital's capacity to prevent medication errors.

More than 2,100 hospitals were considered for the Leapfrog Top Hospital award. Among those, Nicklaus Children's Hospital received a Top Children's Hospital distinction. A total of 132 Top Hospitals were selected, including the eight Top Children's Hospitals, in which Nicklaus Children's was listed.





TRANSFER CENTER MOVES CARE FORWARD

The Nicklaus Children's Transfer Center, established in 2023, is invisible to the patients and families it serves. The center provides a single-point-of-contact resource to ensure the safe and timely transfer of children from hospitals, emergency departments, urgent care centers and physician offices. Due to the enhanced coordination, it is creating a better experience for doctors and referring healthcare organizations, and, subsequently, the patients and families they serve.

ADVANCING CARE ACCESS: YES, THE DOCTOR CAN SEE YOU SOON!

Waiting weeks to see a specialty doctor can be a common occurrence in the world of healthcare. In 2023, Nicklaus Children's Pediatric Specialists, the employed clinical practice of Nicklaus Children's, continued its intensive focus on seeing new patients quickly for their first appointments.

By focusing on creating new appointment slots, use of telehealth, physician assistants and advanced nurse practitioners, the health system was able to schedule a significantly higher percentage of new patients within just three days of their appointment request in 2023.

"When families are referred to a specialist, they are concerned and eager to get answers. We are pleased that we continue to make progress in helping families receive the care they are seeking within a week's time," said Dr. Chad Perlyn, Senior Vice President, Nicklaus Children's Health System; President, Nicklaus Children's Pediatric Specialists.



FOOD FOR SALUD: MOVING FAMILIES FROM FOOD INSECURITY TO NUTRITION SECURITY

As part of a focus on supporting the overall health of patient families and our surrounding community, Nicklaus Children's launched *Food for Salud*, a program dedicated to using the power of food and nutrition to promote the well-being of children and families.

Food for Salud is part of the hospital's Office of Community Health, founded in 2023, which convenes internal and external collaborations to advance children's health and serves as an incubator for new community health programs and initiatives led by Nicklaus Children's experts. This multi-disciplinary office addresses social drivers of health, community health services, our community health needs assessment and implementation plans, and our community benefit work.

"Nicklaus Children's has a long tradition of supporting the health and well-being of families in our community," said Dr. Jennifer McCafferty-Fernandez, Senior Vice President of External Affairs and Experience and Chief of Staff. "The Office of Community Health is elevating our focus and championing new initiatives such as *Food for Salud* that are making a difference for the most vulnerable members of our community."

During 2023, the hospital screened over 19,000 patients for food insecurity, identifying 2,354 families facing challenges in obtaining nutritious foods.

Families experiencing food insecurity are referred to Feeding South Florida, an organization whose mission includes providing immediate access to nutritious food. In addition to providing this critical access, Feeding South Florida assists with enrollment in benefits such as WIC and SNAP.

The hospital also leveraged experience in clinical nutrition to provide education and cooking demonstrations at the hospital and in the community to help children and families learn fun and approachable ways to incorporate nutritious foods into their lives. benefits such as WIC and SNAP.




NICKLAUS CHILDREN'S AMONG 'MOST LOVED WORKPLACES'


FORWARD IN RETAINING OUR AMAZING WORKFORCE




